<u>Lie Detection Report – Andrew Weiss</u>

Baseline: These are the nonverbal behaviors the subject does when he/she is telling a true story. Here is what you look like when you are telling the truth:

- Eyebrow raise for emphasis
- Eyebrows draw in and eyes narrow or look up when thinking
- Slight smile in answers
- Direct eye contact with camera
- Some head movement
- Wide shoulders and upper body
- Some shoulder movement

Here is what you sound like when you are telling the truth:

- Tongue click at the end of sentences
- Animated tone of voice
- Medium volume

Nervous Baseline: This is how you look when we started to ask the harder and embarrassing questions. Here is what you look like when you are telling the truth:

- Big swallow right before embarrassing moment story and throughout story
- More hand gestures
- More head and upper body movement
- Nervous smiling
- Head hang in defeat
- Lip purse (mashing lips together; typically happens right before or after we share something that makes us nervous or uncomfortable)
- Face touch/self-soothing before greatest fear
- Sadness microexpression

Here is what you sound like when you are telling the truth:

- Faster vocal pace
- Very animated, excited tone

Lying Red Flags: During your lying answers you had a few 'red flags' that the research says are common lying tells. Yours were:

- More monotone voice
- Less movement in the head and upper body
- Including unrelated details to the story ("it was raining that day")
- Slight anger expression
- More "they", "them" and less "I", "me"

Conclusion: Your biggest tell is <u>less animation in both the voice and body</u>. This <u>matches</u> / does not match the research on lie detection.
